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process, we're totally taking it out and doing away with it if we get to the point where after the pilot project we adopt this statewide. And that concerns me. But what concerns me even more about this amendment, as opposed to the one that was printed on page 410 of your Journal, is that it takes out any kind of a review process after you've had the pilot project. There's no, no review process. And I understand Senator Warner's objection to a review process because it's my understanding that the Program Evaluation Committee already has lots of requests for program evaluations, so if we start mandating in bills what that committee's going to do, it's going to be overwhelmed before the year's out so I understand that. But I still like to have some kind of a review process when we're making this kind of a fundamental shift. And so I've got staff that is putting together some kind of an amendment that at least would mandate that review for the Health and Human Services Committee to do if no one else. And that doesn't mean that Program Evaluation couldn't still do it, in fact I think they should still do it because they're the ones that have the staff to go into this in great detail. Having said that, Senator Avery, I do have some questions now.

SENATOR AVERY: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: How many total DSS employees are there doing internal reviews right now?

SENATOR AVERY: That's hard. There originally was 11 people that were doing the internal reviews. In a conversation with Jessie Rasmussen, who had just recently been the assistant director, she has said, she has told me that they have done some shifting, and that goes along with the, the agency's plan, I think, or philosophy that maybe these reviews that they're doing aren't as important. So they, it seems like they have shifted a few people out of that, that unit to do other things.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Wait a minute. Jessie Rasmussen's still the agency assistant director, right?

SENATOR AVERY: Right.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay,...

SENATOR AVERY: That's what I...
