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statewide. And unless that is amended on, then I would be opposed to the pilot project...

SPEAKER WITHEM: Time

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...going forward.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members. I'll just take a couple minutes then give some time to Senator Schimek. I agree with Senator Bohlke's point and with Senator Schimek's point. If you're going to try this out, and actually the original proposal, that's what we had tried to negotiate out that we establish some different models, try them out, review that, and then take the next step afterwards. But we had this bill kind of rushed forward and, unfortunately, that process, which could have started last year, we had it arranged where these pilots could have been in place by now, we could be talking with some experience and some information, but the Foster Care Review Board decided to force our hand and force the issue and that was unfortunate. So I do agree that there should be a review. I also, again, reiterate that, although Senator Crosby talked about all the problems that have been between DSS and Foster Care, they have been there, that's true. In a way it'd be... I think that the Department of Social Services looks to the Foster Care Review Board the way we look at John Breslow, it's a little...but that kind of a relationship. So you can understand why they feel, why they feel that way. But nevertheless, there is a role to be played with the Foster Care Review Board, and the question is this changes that role dramatically. And I think that, I think the role change is not appropriate. I'm going to give the rest of my time to Senator Schimek.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Schimek, you have about 3 minutes and 40 seconds.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Withem, members of the body, I'd like to give some of my time to Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: I have three minutes and ten seconds.
