

be in charge of those. And I guess what you're saying is that the Legislature would then, at a subsequent time, make a determination on who might in fact take over various functions, and that would be statutorily. And we would have that opportunity here at a later date. I guess my point in bringing this up was what would be the time frame that we would be discussing in the "disassembling" of the constitutional...duties under the constitution of the Public Service Commission?

SENATOR BROWN: Well, there are already...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: ...some proposals that are out there, a bill about...that will deal with some of the transportation issues from the Governor's "Transportation Efficiency Project. But we would need to deal, within two years, with the organizational structure of the Public Service Commission in statute.

SENATOR VRTISKA: So you're talking about the possibility that upon the approval of the voters on this particular constitutional amendment, you think within two years there would be takeover by the...under...on this statute, and it would be then run by the various other agencies? Is that what you're saying?

SENATOR BROWN: What I'm saying is that there are already administrative proposals out there for the administrative part of the agency. There are already ideas, those things that can be shifted. In terms of the statutory part and the structure of the agency, you would need to do it within two years.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay, appreciate that. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Schimek. Excuse me, Senator. Mr. Clerk, do we have an amendment? An amendment?
