If you're against the full blown casino, fine, but this is the first step if you want to put just those few machines at your Legion club. I don't think this is unreasonable. I don't think this is a dodge. I'll be listening to debate and I may learn something. But right now it just doesn't make sense. Thank you very much.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Hilgert. Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Madam Speaker and members, I'd like to ask a question of Senator Jensen here in a minute. But I'd like to remind you that tomorrow, before the Revenue Committee, there will be two CAs up, or whatever they are. One will have to do with city-county merger, that is going to be and will be no different than what we're talking about with this CA. And, of course, Senator Jensen mentioned how we shouldn't vote for this because we could be voting for a pig in a poke, that the possibility exists when people vote on this they won't know what they're voting for, they're not sure how that will happen. So, Jim, I love you, but I got to ask you this question. You know if people voted for the city-county merger, oh by the way, I have to mention this real quick, so hold onto the question there. Talked to a city official or two and I was told that the city would probably support the vote in the Revenue Committee tomorrow to merge city and county governments, or county and city as far as I'm concerned. And that they support that for a lot of reasons, but mostly because they're sure it will pass. But they oppose this CA on gambling because of all the details or whatever the excuses might be, because it might pass. Think about that. Little inconsistent, isn't it? I assume that the senators will be a lot more consistent on all these things. And if we're not going to give people the right to vote on this, we're not going to give them the right to vote on anything because they're so dumb they don't know what they're voting for. So the details are what I'm curious about, city-county merger. I'm not sure, Jim, if you'd support city-county merger CA. But if you intend to can you tell me, who will take over who, and how will we merge the assessors office, for example?
