

SENATOR ROBAK: I think we established a precedent yesterday of some degree, I am not sure, but there are other gambling bills in committee right now that have not been heard, because I have one in committee that has not been heard. So dor't you think it would be wise not to do...to bracket this bill until all the gambling bills have been heard in committee? I don't know how you voted...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Well....

SENATOR ROBAK: ...on that bracket, I didn't pay any attention because I really didn't care, but I think we did establish a precedent for some reason,...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Well, I...

SENATOR ROBAK: ...and...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: ...contrary, I did support you, I didn't think it should have been bracketed.

SENATOR ROBAK: Well, thank you very much for that, for that bit, but at any rate, we do have some gambling bills in front of...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I know.

SENATOR ROBAK: They just haven't been heard yet.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I know, but, Senator, the Attorney General stated unless we have a vote of the people, we cannot expand to any video or...

SENATOR ROBAK: Senator, can I talk on my time, Senator Schellpeper. The Attorney General's opinion is just that, an opinion on a piece of paper, and I would like to give you a little bit of highlight of my bill, and Senator Hilgert (sic) touched on it, in fact she signed onto my bill. My bill is...it puts us back to where we were in 1984, '83, rather, and I will give you a little bit of history on this if anybody has got time to listen until my time runs out.
