

SENATOR WILL: ...that's...

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Excellent.

SENATOR WILL: ...that would be what I would anticipate, and knowing that we can engage in that process, I would support the bracket motion at this time.

SENATOR CROSBY: Mr. Clerk. Thank you, Senator Will. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Senator Chambers, I understand you want to withdraw your bracket motion, Senator. Madam President, I have a priority motion. Senator Chambers would move to bracket until June 1, 1996.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Chambers, to open on your bracket motion.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, what I was doing with that first bracket motion was creating an opportunity for me to make some comments, and I was going to leave it up there long enough for others to make some comments also, and then I was going to pull it. But since those who support the bill are willing to bracket, I am going to make the bracket vote have...vote have some significance. I know and everybody else knows that if we give the lobbyists additional time, a few more days, they can twist some more arms, and do the very things that I said they would do in making this body fold. I know that and we all know it. So since we want some kind of a vote, we can get a vote on the bracket motion. By moving to bracket until June 1, 1996, that means that we would not consider it again this session, and since this is the second session of this term, all bills that are not acted on would die. It will not carry over until 1997. I think some of the comments Senator Lynch made are absolutely on point, and they are the kind...he said things that I do agree with, but it is seldom that we will take a panoramic view and tie these various issues in that need to be discussed at the same time when we have an issue like this kind of legalization of gambling. But when I consider the amounts of money that big businesses don't have to pay in order to support government and pay for the services that they get because that amount is shifted to ordinary people, I
