

conviction, I don't oppose...I oppose gambling, so I am not going to let anybody vote, as Senator Robinson states. Whether the people in his district support it or not, he says I'm right because that's my conviction, and that's his right, but you should also consider the people in your district, whether they support or not. Maybe we are arguing here this morning, we will put it on the ballot, and it won't pass. I don't have any idea what's going to happen. And then if we're as far as what we can go into expansion...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: ...of gambling. This morning we have a chance to go back to take care of some of the concern that some of the other senators have. I think let us do that. Let us bracket the bill. Let us go back and try to discuss with the senators about this Gaming Commission and about different things that...the different concerns that they have, come back next week. Why waste time talking about something here that has nothing to do with 43CA. So I think we're wasting time this morning. Let's come back next week, let's bracket it today, come back next week, so that we can get something meaningful without all of this...this conversation we are having this morning. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Schellpeper. Senator Robinson.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Madam President, members of the body, Senator Schellpeper says I am representing my district, and you know he is right a hundred percent. He is right a hundred percent. First time I ran for the Legislature I ran against six people. I ended up winning. The second time I ran I ran against another person. I got 80 percent of the votes. So, evidently, they must have some confidence in me. Now Senator Schellpeper will get up and say, well, I beat you out by a half a percent. Well, I think he was a half percent below, but that's what they voted. That's why they put me in this office to stand up and vote the issues. You can talk about any issue you want here about whether we should vote for it, or whether the public should vote for it. I'd like to just go on. Could you tell me when I have a minute and a half left, please. Could you tell me that.
