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person comes forward or a younger person, who knows, they're a registered voter, that's the person; they say, do you want your taxes to go up "X" number of dollars? Do you think, you know...are you under-taxed now, do you have enough money now? And they say, no. They say, well, you've got an election form today that if you vote yes on, your taxes are going to go up; we need to vote no. And they say, well gee, we didn't know that. Well, they'll say, well grab that form, grab that form and let me show you. And then they'll sit down and say, so we need to vote no on this one. They'll fill it out; they say no; put it in, and then they mail it. And they do that on a concentrated effort, for the most part. Is that a scenario that could happen?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I guess anything can happen, Senator Bernard-Stevens. Currently, they can do this via radio, via TV tube, it's on there every five minutes. In an important election you have...I mean you have every scenario possible now that you can think of to change people's minds. And so I don't think...I think this is a less factor because the mail comes...it can come with anywhere between one...ten and twenty days. They don't know for sure when that mail is going to come. I just...I just don't see how they could even...

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Okay, see, there is the difference where I am beginning to lean not so in favor of even...even the bill is because I understand how politics works. God knows I've run commercials myself trying to urge people to vote for this, you know, the candidate or whatever. It's like selling hamburger. If you can put the product so that people want it and they think they need it, maybe they'll actually, you know, vote for it or purchase it. But, still, the voter has to listen, they have to wait till election day, they hear all the things out there and then they have to go to a little booth and make a conscious decision what they do. In this case, we could have the potential of people actually like going up and signing a petition, you know. There'll be people who would never vote for a petition if it was in the voting booth, but they'll sign the petition when someone's at their doorstep saying, do you really want this, you know, do you really think the administration is doing a good job on the schools, do you really want your taxes to go up? And they'll say no. And sometimes just to get them out of the way they'll say you're right, I'll do it. In fact then they'll stay there and say, let's go ahead

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
