Maybe it's their neighbors coming to talk to them. Maybe it's family, relatives that have been garnered by one side to go talk to them and see what they can do. Who knows what it is. But do you want to have a process where people can be right in your face, telling you what to do, giving you all of one side of the story, and then that person can vote right at that point? We have made the law so that that can never happen in our country. We don't want that to happen. Look at what happens to other countries. And how do you know that somebody won't come into the house and be so much a zealot of the issue that they would actually take the ballot and say, you don't know what you're doing, we're voting for you, we're putting it in, we're sending it in, and it's up to the other individual to say that they didn't vote? How do you know that won't happen? Because you and I both know there are some really crazy zealots out there. And to open up our voting process of our country to this, I don't think is a wise policy. Even though I understand what Senator Cudaback is trying to do, I understand we're trying to get more participation, I understand we're trying to make it easier for people. But sometimes democracy is just darn tough. Sometimes democracy just can't be easy. Sometimes you actually have to inform yourself, get registered to vote. We even allow them to do it for the motor voter now, making it easier to register, but sometimes you just have to go through the process because that's what democracy is. But democracy is not having somebody...
