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mail-in election or an election conducted by mail, if it's something they favor and think the mail is likely to make it turn out the way they want to, or if it's something they don't like and think that if it's done by mail it won't succeed, then it places maybe too much discretion in the hands of the political subdivision without any input from the public. So maybe I would offer the amendment, at least so we could discuss it, that would say that this decision would be made by the political subdivision after a public hearing. Then at least those who were going to vote know that this particular election is being considered one which will be handled by way of mail. I wish we would keep in mind as we proceed also that the bill is restricted quite a bit in terms of when this can come into play. It has to be a special election occurring at a time when other issues are not being voted on. So it's this one election by itself, free-standing, and it would have to deal with an issue rather than filling an office or electing a candidate. So we already have it restricted by the language that exists in the bill right now. That being the case, if we required, although I'm not offering such an amendment, but if it seemed like it could go I would support it, if we required...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...those elections to be conducted by mail, I would support it. I have yet to find out how many special elections, on the average, occur a year. And I doubt that more than one would occur dealing with an issue more than once in any given political subdivision. But those are things to consider farther down the line. In order for us to work our way through those things we have to defeat the kill motion. So I am strongly opposed to the kill motion and I'm in support of Senator Cudaback's bill.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, Mr. Speaker and members, I hate to rise in support of the IPP. I really wanted to...I didn't...was not going to vote to advance, Senator Cudaback. IPP seems so final, but the way it's been presented to us I will be supporting the IPP. I wanted to ask a couple questions, though, Senator Cudaback, if you will.
