If you look at page 4, this is the language that my amendment would involve. Starting in line 22 it says, a political subdivision may, by resolution of the governing body of the subdivision, my amendment would add, "or ordinance in the case of a city or village", because the city does not operate by way of a resolution. I've talked to Senator Cudaback about it. This does not change anything about the bill. So, if you have any questions, I'm prepared to answer them, otherwise I ask that you adopt this amendment.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Next, Senator Jones.
