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of it. But anyway, the way they handle it up there his address is Asby and one mailman goes every other day one way, and then the other way the next day. So the mailman actually travels the six days, but he goes out one way out of town, one way, and the other way. So he only gets three...mail three times a day...a week rather. So it will really help on issues like that, and I do like the ten-day window on that account. I guess I'd like to ask Senator Cudaback one question here that might help clarify things. If a community would decide...shut me off. If a community would decide to do something or have an election, do they send to every registered voter in that district, or that county, or that community?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes, you must send every registered voter, that's one of the stipulations in the bill, you have to, because everybody has an opportunity to vote.

SENATOR JONES: Do they check out then to see whether they are all...

SPEAKER WITHEM PRESIDING

SPEAKER WITHEM: One minute.

SENATOR JONES: ...registered voters?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Absolutely. When those come back, this is why it's more of a safeguard than our current way, those are checked off when they come back, the way they are signed, exactly the way they are signed, and if they're not that way they are thrown out. It's just that simple. Currently they do not check the signatures.

SENATOR JONES: That's what I was getting at. So this would be more of a check than the way it was before. So that's another reason that I would support it. And another reason I'd support it, it's not mandatory, they got...if they want to do it in their community they can. So thank you.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Jones. Senator Chambers, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Bernard-Stevens a question.
