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SENATOR ABOUD: Yes, they were there, the Patrol was positive about the bill.

SENATOR HARTNETT: In their neutral...

SENATOR ABOUD: In their neutral capacity,...

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay.

SENATOR ABOUD: ...yeah, whatever that means. And the court administrator just talked about how it would work and function. And the same thing with the Department of Public Institutions, it was more...right, they were, they were just...I don't know, maybe they were there for the, for another hearing or something, but they came and testified in a neutral capacity, and they were just talking about the structural, procedural type of things that they needed to do, so. And if you note the, they talk a little bit about it in their fiscal impact there, and it's pretty minimal, so.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Oh, okay.

SENATOR ABOUD: Anyway, but that's basically what they focused in on.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker, I'd give my rest of my time to Senator Chambers.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Chambers, you have three and a half minutes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Hartnett, and thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just, I don't want Senator Witek think I'm overly sensitive, but I am very sensitive when people use the term black to describe those things that are hateful, wicked, and evil. I think Nebraska should be considered the white state no matter what, especially when something negative is being said. So I'm just making it clear that every time the word "black" is used in a negative connotation or denotation, I'm going to express why I take offense at it and point out that it shows the racism which is incorporated into the language of people in this society. And maybe there is not a conscious intent to be offensive, but if I would stand in this Legislature
