

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Okay. So, then it just gets back to one...in one individual's opinion, there ought to be an exception made?

SENATOR BOHLKE: It was put in there to recognize there are certain things all of us recognize that misdemeanors at one age you may have committed, that you would want to come in and give that explanation and give the commissioner that latitude to say I recognize that, and go ahead with the certificate.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: And if it's not public record, then would it be possible that the commissioner might have a relationship with the applicant, either might be a graduate of the same school, or a relative, or something like that, and really, because it's sealed, nobody would ever know? Is that a possibility?

SENATOR BOHLKE: That would be the op...that would be a possibility anytime you have due process with anyone.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: But it is...it would be a possibility? My last question...

SENATOR BOHLKE: A relationship is always a possibility.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Excuse me?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Did you ask if is the possibility of a relationship?

SENATOR MAURSTAD: No, of that particular type of relationship. (Laughter.) Section 6 talks about the costs are going to be borne by the applicant. Do you have any...is there...has the board provided you with a range of what we might be talking about relative to the cost?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes, Senator Maurstad. The State Patrol says that it's normally in the range of \$33, the Department of Ed, because of some personnel costs, are estimating it would be 35.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Thirty-five dollars total?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Correct.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Great, thank you, Senator.
