

complete set of fingerprints. It doesn't even say a complete set of the applicant's fingerprints.

SENATOR BOHLKE: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if I file a complete...if I file a set of fingerprints, ten prints, four fingers and two thumbs, even if they're not mine, I've complied with Section 1.

SENATOR BOHLKE: But then the commissioner, that would come back, I think, wouldn't it, Senator Chambers, to the commissioner that you had tried to attempt that, and that would certainly be a reason to look that you were trying to use an alias, or trying to do something like that and would be a red flag for granting a certificate.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if this law is being written to require fingerprints, wouldn't it be just as easy to say that the person shall submit a complete set, the applicant, of his or her fingerprints? Instead of leaving it so that a person can comply with the literal terms of the law but somehow be found to have done something wrong because the Legislature loosely drafted a bill? How can you say the person did something wrong if he or she complies exactly with what the law says?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Senator Chambers, I do think you have a point. And if you wanted to make that amendment, I certainly have no problem with it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I'm asking the questions. Now, there is nothing that I read on the white sheet, which is now the law, and I'm acknowledging that I've had to kind of skim through it as quickly as I could, and I'm not a speed reader. There is nothing that I see which says that the fingerprints have to be obtained from a law enforcement agency.

SENATOR BOHLKE: I think that that's probably true. In discussion of it so far, there has been no discussion where else one may get those fingerprints. But I think I know where you're going, and I think probably we should, to make it absolutely as tight as possible that we should do that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I could make the set myself, all I'd have to do is put ink on my finger and roll, you know, just roll the
