SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Madam President and members of the Legislature, this is a motion to bracket this terrible bill.

SENATOR CROSBY: (Gavel.) Senators, your conversations again are at a very high level.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Madam Chairman, for that gentle, discrete, delicate tap with the hammer on the desk and it shows the profound respect they have for you because sometimes I have boomed out a hey, hey, hey, and a few will listen. Others have almost broken the mallet and still there is racket, but when you hit that mallet gently in the way I've described, you could hear a microbe tiptoe across cotton, if you know what I mean. At any rate, this is the motion that would bracket this pernicious bill, and the date set in the motion would be June 1st, which, in effect, would kill it. I would like to name this bill "The Bismarck" and based on a movie I had seen, the slogan is, we've got to sink the Bismarck. And the song that was sung said, we've got to sink the Bismarck to the bottom of the sea. I will not sing any portion of the song, but that's my attitude. Okay, Senator Landis, you keep that up and I am going to burst into song, so watch it. This is one of those bills which I think is not going to go anywhere. As long as it hangs around and lives, the lobbyists are going to make money. I don't mind them making money. Being a lobbyist is a more or less honest way to make a living. It is as honest as being a seller of insurance, but then maybe that's not too high a recommendation for either. I intend to get a vote on this motion and I hope the body in discussing this motion will make it clear that the bill is not going to go anywhere and we can dispose of it today. However, should it appear that the body is not of a will to dispose of it today, then I will tell you, frankly, since I have pledged myself to sink the Bismarck, that means it must be done by hook or by crook, by any means necessary, by all means available under the rules, and that, Madam President, is about where we are at this point.
