SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Oh, yes, definitely, every thing what has to be run...

SENATOR JENSEN: Do you know how many people that would require?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I'd have no idea. That's up to...we're not to that point yet. First of all, we have to get a vote of the people.

SENATOR JENSEN: All right. Thank you, Senator Schellpeper. I might just to make a few comments here. First of all, in Las Vegas they have 260 people that work for their commission out there in policing that state, and I mind you that Nebraska will never become a place like Las Vegas in Nevada where it might require that many. But I also might mention that there are tremendous costs in even setting up something like this, and how much revenue do we anticipate getting back into our state? In Illinois, there are 100 state troopers that are assigned to police the casinos back there. And matter of fact, in Springfield, which happens to be a very major...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...city, there was an incident just last year that there weren't state troopers around when an incident occurred to even respond because they were all working at the casinos. It is really interesting also that some of the states that are taking the dollars out of Nebraska have many problems of their own. Those problems are expanding. If we bring, certainly, gambling into this state, we're going to compound the problems that we already have, and we are...we do receive problems because of what is going around in our borders. But it is a convenience item. The closer you live to a casino, the more problems that you are going to have with that. If...this is one large step, and if we go into this, how do we control and say it is only going to go in casinos, and if...

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.
