

Fonner Park Scholarship Program, 161; College Park in Grand Island, \$150,000; Island Oasis, a water park in Grand Island, they donated land to it, \$101,000; United Way, 103,000. They're now building a soccer field for children to use on their facility. I think it's an industry that's viable. I think it perhaps needs a little jump start on the eastern side of us, our neighbors in Omaha. Fonner Park will survive, we'll keep on racing horses and we'll keep on serving the people. We talked a little bit about keno. Fonner Park runs the keno operation in Grand Island. Thirty thousand dollars was budgeted to repair the Plains Center for Mental Health. Eighty thou...or \$8,000 the Economic Development Corporation. Another 14...that was 8,000 for the Cornhusker Ammunition (inaudible) to have funds, some starting money. Fourteen thousand what the Economic Development Corporation. Fifty thousand from the keno funds to Stuhr Museum. They've budgeted this year 100,000. They have allocated 7,000 to family violence. These are our neighbors we have out there. They've been good neighbors. They've supported our town and our area. And it goes to Kearney, it goes to Hastings, the whole Midwest has benefited from it. I think we must continue and address this issue to make horse racing solid, prolong the life, maybe, but I think we've got to look at these options. If I could say one thing about Nebraska, we probably on the downside of the curve. And I'm not a real strong...I probably don't gamble that much, but we missed the boat and we're losing. That boat has left maybe, but we're losing as we look around. We have now the Santee Indian Reservation. Do you think it's going to stop there? I doubt it. You think the Santee Indian Reservation is going to do such things as I just told you in Nebraska? I doubt it seriously. I think we have to make a decision. I (inaudible) make it today, I'd like to see it today. I hope we can get together on this thing and think about it. I think we ought to abandon the bracket motion and get to this issue of this horse racing and our continued...the economic impact in Nebraska is great. I know you hear figures and they tell you it's 200,000, 300,000 dollars, it's agriculture. But without some support, I really fear that we're going to lose Fonner Park or we're going to lose Ak-Sar-Ben. And when we lose Ak-Sar-Ben we lose the quality that we've enjoyed out in Fonner. Fonner, of course, now will be racing the fifteenth, I believe, their first race day. They'll be running, they're ready, they've been set back. The track is still frozen but they assured me last weekend and this nice weather will have them ready to go.
