Vrtiska, are you asking for a point of order, point of privilege?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Point of personal privilege, if I might, Senator Crosby.

SENATOR CROSBY: All right.

SENATOR VRTISKA: This morning we have, I think, in the back room...oh, he's up here now, a person many of you know, who served in this Legislature and served as Fire Marshal, and now he's up here, it don't seem like he can keep a job anyplace.
