SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Yes, it will, but within the 5 million you are looking at, that number includes the four areas of the state that are already underway. So it's...

SENATOR PIRSCH: Okay.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: So that's where that total figure comes from.

SENATOR PIRSCH: That was one of my questions. So if we do a simple mathematics quickly, then right now, if you are going to add 3 million, right now they are spending over 2 million for the pilot projects they're doing now.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: That would be correct.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Okay, and, you know, when I look at what the Office of Juvenile Services right now has or is mandated to do, the Office of Juvenile Services shall coordinate the programs and the services of the juvenile justice system; develop and use intake and assessment procedures for the evaluation of juveniles, and I assume they are doing that now; provide case management for juveniles, and we don't know what kind of numbers that will increase when they add these other four areas; provide secure facility alternative programs, and I would assume that all juveniles are already being provided that service; coordinate educational, vocational, and social counseling, and therein lies programs which I think probably are a combination of private as well as...Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: I am sorry, Senator Pirsch. I was in a discussion with Senator Kristensen. I apologize.
