PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Wickersham. Is there any discussion on the adoption of the Wickersham amendment? Seeing none, Senator Wickersham waives closing. The question before you is the adoption of the amendment to LB 984. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the adoption of Senator Wickersham's amendment.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Wickersham amendment is adopted.

ASSISTANT CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Is there any further discussion on LB 984? Seeing none, Senator Wickersham waives closing. The question before you is the advancement of LB 984. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: LB 984 advances. LB 1038.

ASSISTANT CLERK: LB 1038 was introduced by the Revenue Committee. (Read title.) The bill was read for the first time on January 4th of this year, referred to the Revenue Committee, they report the bill to General File with no committee amendments.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Chair recognizes Senator Warner to open on the bill.

SENATOR WARNER: Madam President, members of the Legislature, LB 1038 is kind of a clean-up bill. LB 490, of last session, you'll recall that was the bill that established the Tax Equalization Review Commission, or TERC, which some day next week you'll be voting on confirmation for the four new mem...three new members, three members, all of whom are new, that will be...have been appointed to this important body. But there was a couple of...three things that needed to be cleaned up in it. One was that in the bill last year, the references to state property tax in some provisions was repealed under the assumption that that was obsolete. As it turned out there's a couple of sections there that dealt with delinquent or
