background checks. They could also do that on anyone else, volunteers or any of the other groups that we have discussed. What we cannot do is we cannot get at the criminal records of those who come from another state, who do not reside in Nebraska. That clearly does not seem to make much common sense. We can have some information about our teachers that we usually know well, know a great deal about. But those moving from another state that we know very little about we cannot find out anything to check as far as their criminal background. So that is the real difference in what this bill does and what we do accomplish in allowing our schools to have that bit of information on those people moving from out of state. And so, with that, I thank you for your patience on this bill. It's been before us before. I thank Senator Hilgert for prioritizing it, and I ask for your support of LB 754. Thank you.
