trying to make, not trying to hassle the bill. It was your choice to put it on consent calendar and the Speaker, and I just wanted to make sure that the body understood that we're making a significant change again on this policy and draw their attention to the fact that there was no fiscal note on this bill, and that is not possible, that is not possible to not have a fiscal note on this. But I will definitely let you have your time to advance this bill, but I will have some more questions on Select File.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Witek. Senator Pirsch.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the body. And, Senator Bernard-Stevens, I also have great concern with this bill and think it probably deserves more debate than on consent calendar. And I apologize for, for being late and breathless this morning, but probably not the first time. I just caught the last of Senator Witek's debate, so I have not heard if you had discussed or had been asked, Senator Bernard-Stevens, about the effect that the combination or the merger of these five offices is going to make with this particular office. And I wonder if you'd speak to that if you haven't already, Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Bernard-Stevens has requested that this bill be removed from consent calendar. I will honor that request. Mr. Clerk, LB 1048.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 1048, introduced by Senator Fisher. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 4 of this year. It was referred to the Judiciary Committee, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Fisher.

SENATOR FISHER: Mr. Speaker and members, this, of course, is a noncontroversial bill, (laughter) hopefully. But I introduced this bill, 1048, in order to clarify some provisions regarding within the garnishment of the answering notices. There currently is two conflicting statutes on this subject, and under Section 25-1056, the garnishee must answer within ten days from the date the court issues the summons. In contracts, contrasts, Section 25-1010(2) allows a garnishee a period of ten days from the date of the service, from the date that the service...or the
