This has nothing to do with licensing, nothing to do with anything other than the fact that these technical changes such as the board comes up with (inaudible) technology and this simply says that we will adopt these changes and apply them to our code book. And it's like I say, it's done every three years, it's something that has to be done and if we don't, why, we simply fall behind. And so I would just simply ask you to adopt these technical changes and bring our code book up with the national code book, adopted by the National Fire Protection Service. And so with that, any questions, I will urge your passage of LB 933. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK PRESIDING

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Is there any discussion of LB 933? Seeing none, Senator Cudaback to close. Closing is waived. The question before you is the advancement of LB 933. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

CLERK: Madam President, 1008 by Senator Landis. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 4 of this year, at that time referred to the Banking Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by the Banking, Commerce, and Insurance Committee.
