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bothered by the fact that we don't have it on, and the discussion on General File. Everyone will go down the column and look right at their district,...

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...I disagree with that philosophy, but if, you know, that's what people want they'll eventually get it.

SENATOR ABBOD: Well, let me ask you, Senator Bohlke, you have absolutely no idea how this bill will impact your district?

SENATOR BOHLKE: I have a general idea that it is, I would be like Senator Bernard Stevens, it's going to hurt a lot of schools in my district as far as if they're just looking at the numbers.

SENATOR ABBOD: How many school districts do you have in your district?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Probably...I'd have to look, maybe 12, 13.

SENATOR ABBOD: Okay. And, but you're not sure, when you're going to go back there this weekend and you're going to talk to constituents at a town hall meeting and they're going to ask you if this is going to increase the amount of property taxes they're going to have to pay, you're going to have to tell them that you have absolutely no idea?

SENATOR BOHLKE: No, I won't be able to. I will say that if they're an equalization school it would probably help them, if they're a nonequalization school it would probably negatively impact them.

SENATOR ABBOD: So they're property taxes would go up.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Time. I'd like to take the opportunity to announce that Senator Brown has two guests under the south balcony, Carol Keiler and Janice Fonda, both from Omaha.
