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because that's why we're up here. I guess what I'm trying to understand is, when are we going to have any numbers that mean anything that we'll be able to take a look? Is that going to come before we get way down the road, or when is that going to develop?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Well, as I said, certainly the department I am sure is watching to see how many changes we are doing on General File. Then they will have a good sense of what the bill does and they'll be able to address that issue, and I know they will work very hard, by Select File, that we would have that printout.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, I appreciate that, and then the other question that...I guess the other comment that I have is that most of us up here understand, and certainly I do, that the big issue in Nebraska now is property tax, and I'm hearing that this is not going to do a lot for property tax as far as schools are concerned. Is that a fair statement or not?

SENATOR BOHLKE: I think what Senator Withem was saying is this a major property tax, and he addressed what it really does, but certainly those school districts that are equalized districts, that look neediest, the more that you help them, you would have a potential for property tax relief for those equalized school districts.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, it's been my...it's been my...somewhat of an indication that I've had through the process of this that many of my school districts in my district would be helped by this bill. I don't know that that's...

SENATOR BOHLKE: I think you have a large number of equalized school districts in your district.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I do have, actually, and so what you are telling me, in trying to come to a conclusion on this whole process, is those schools that are equalized will, in fact, see some assistance in property tax relief. Is that the way you view it?

SENATOR BOHLKE: A lot of them will, especially if they happen to be high transportation districts.
