

SENATOR BOHLKE: No, a dollar, twelve.

SENATOR ROBINSON: It has moved up then from the past year then, I had it from the year before. Anyway, like I said, I don't know how it affects my schools but I think we're taking too big a bite out of the income tax. And I think it...even my good friend, Senator "Stevens" mentioned the other day, that we talked about a printout, and I said, well, look at it in four or five years, and that's what I'd say to you, Senator Brashear, and Senator Pedersen, over there, and a few others that represent some of the suburban districts in Omaha, because if you had a five-year printout, you may change your mind, and you may not want it to go so fast because there's some other school districts, as time goes by, you take the Millard School District. Their valuation is starting to flatten out, and their income tax went up 155 percent. I don't...I am sure, I know Blair's income tax has gone up, and their valuation has gone up, but I am not sure about my schools up in Cuming County. But let me repeat that, Senator Witek, Senator Brashear, Senator Pedersen, and Senator Avery, that you better take a good look down the line. Are you going to throw away a 155 percent increase in income tax? Think about that, think about that. That's a lot of dough, boy. Anyway you crack it, it's a lot of dough. The other day I mentioned about, and I look at my...usually Senator Landis looks at me when he debates, you know, he turns around and he looks at me, this time I am going to look at him. You ought to look at sales tax. You know you ought to get some sales tax out of the city of Lincoln for schools. I think they are ripping you off. I think...I think...I think the city of Omaha, sixty, I think it's sixty-seven or eight million dollars they get on sales tax. What do the schools get? Nothing. They don't get a penny. Lincoln needs some...they need some more money. Let's give them five or six million of that. I am sure...I am sure the city, the lobbyists for the cities would be with open arms, you'd love that, wouldn't you? Think about that. That's something to think about. The other day, and Senator Hartnett is here, we had a little bill called tax increment financing. In fact, a good friend of mine was opposing the bill from the Bellevue Schools, and I didn't know this, I don't even know, I don't think I voted for the bill, but tax increment financing is where...I want you to know the cities of Hastings, Lincoln, and Omaha have used it quite a bit.
