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extent, but it's consistent with my objective, and that is to get to the point where we have the maximum investment of these funds, we try and hold down or reduce a bureaucracy that I think has been created, and maximize the return to the kids, for which the purpose was originally initiated. And if that includes holding some land in perpetuity, then I'll do what I think is best for the kids.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, how can that be done with the... Okay, so you'd be willing to modify your position to allow land to come in, under those circumstances, if those were the conditions under which the donor would set.

SENATOR BROMM: If their...if the facts support that that's in the best interests, then I would certainly be willing of that modification to be adopted. But I don't know that yet, I don't think, until the end of this year.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Members of the Legislature, there's something, I hate to use the term, surreal about the discussion that I'm listening to. On the one hand people talk as though they're hardheaded realists...

SENATOR WILL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...who understand investments, how the real estate market is going to fluctuate, how the bond market and securities market, the stock market in general is not going to fluctuate, that money is always going to be safe, it's always going to produce a profit. Then when you begin to ask specific questions, all of a sudden they're not sure what things are, where they stand, what they mean, until this group of bureaucrats, in whom they have no trust, comes back with a report. I know that somebody may try to call the question, but if they do I'm going to put up a reconsideration motion, because there are some questions I want to ask with reference to Senator Bromm's amendment.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Elmer. Senator Elmer waives. Senator Witek. Question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote yes, opposed no. We are voting on ceasing debate. Have you all voted? Mr. Clerk, please record.
