the university or the state colleges. I would ask that we reject this amendment. No land is going to be sold before we come back next session, pursuant to LB 1205. So why are we going to now convert it into a hybrid bill where certain people have their interests looked after and guaranteed, but we are not going to put guarantees in for the children?

SENATOR WILL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I hope that what you will do is reject Senator Bromm's amendment, but in fairness to him, he gave me this time, he should have the last word to explain to you why you ought to adopt his amendment anyway, and I relinquish the rest of his time.

SENATOR WILL: Senator Bromm, you have about 45 seconds.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you. I think Senator Chambers' point is that he wants to be sure that the opportunity is there or that the requirement is there that we revisit this legislation next session. Anyone of the 49 of us will have that opportunity to introduce a bill. The Education Committee is going to take a hard look at it, and I suspect that if there are needed changes, there will be bills introduced next session. I am very comfortable with that. I hope that he would feel free to introduce a bill if he feels there needs to be, but in fairness to these people, there is no bill introduced, somehow I think I would like to see this cleaned up and clarified. It doesn't change the existing practice or law, simply gives the state colleges and university, in their endowment funds, the...

SENATOR WILL: Time.

SENATOR BROMM: ...proceeds of these lands sold in their behalf. Thank you.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you, Senator Bromm. You've heard the closing. The question before the body is the adoption of the Bromm amendment to LB 1205. All those in favor vote aye, opposed no. Mr. Clerk, please record.
