amending and the kidnapping statute, it does make some remarks to some of the crimes that are under that statute, but it certainly wouldn't put the onus, the burden on someone to prove the intent of the individual who committed these crimes, or the purpose. I mean you've got two things in there now, the purpose and intent. It's not just the intent as is Senator Beutler's, now we've got purpose and intent. Maybe, ... who knows what the purpose, who can even follow whether there's any type of logic in an individual who would harm a child in this way, if they had an intent or a purpose. The problem with proving this would prove monumental and would, as you want to do, exempt out so many individuals because you're not voting for this bill any way. You don't want this bill, you don't want anything to do with this bill, you told me a long time ago that you were going to hassle this bill, and that's what you're doing. But I know the people on this floor are waiting patiently, and I hope you will wait patiently until we get through this amendment and any others that follow to try to weaken or change this bill to make it less effective, and in some cases ineffective, regardless, I am not worried about qualifying for some federal funds. I am worried about protecting the children in this state because forty-seven states have already adopted this language, they have adopted a Sex Offender Registration Act. I have law enforcement people from across the state telling me they can't prove it, but they think that individuals are coming into this state because they don't have to register. Now that, as a mother, scares me to death. And I'm sure every mother and father in this state hearing something like that would have the same fears. And I know you say that we shouldn't be fearful and we shouldn't, you know, pass laws to this, but these are our children, these are minor children that we are talking about here. This, this state needs to get in sync here with the rest of the country, and having a uniform law is an intelligent thing to do in something like this. And I am usually an individual who doesn't like overregulation from the federal government. But I can see perfect sense, common sense in the fact that if you have the same strength and the same offenses across the United States, then there is no...
