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causes an undue burden or a lack of viable fiscal resources. If it's a county, I would assume the levy is, cannot exceed the fifty cent constitutional limit and then some kind of a documentation why other entitlement costs are such that the, that there is not adequate other means of raising revenue. I have all the sympathy in the world for the problem in Richardson County, but I have a suspicion that this could become a major cost for state government on down the line. Senator Beutler has talked about if we move in the direction whether by petition or statutorily with even further limitations on expenditures, no doubt that maybe we'll have to have something like this to meet some of the problems of local governments should that happen. But I would be much more comfortable if it was much more clearly defined and not nearly what appears to me very wide open. Senator Vrtiska, at least if you could give me some idea how broad. You mentioned some things, but how broad or in what way does the term "legal mandates" lead, does it limit anything? And then some justification why the state should be the insurer of federal mandates. I wouldn't argue about state mandates, because with those we can change. But I see no basis for the state to be the insurer for the cost of federal mandates. I'll give you the rest of my time to respond.

SENATOR CROSBY: You have about a minute and a half to respond.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Oh, thank you, Senator Warner. I'd just like to respond by saying that we spent a great deal of time trying to make this as narrow as we possibly could. And I would certainly appreciate working with you or any member of the body in making a definite interpretation of some of these, some of these areas you feel that are rather...not defined very well. We spent a great deal of time trying to make this as narrow as we could simply because we didn't want anybody that had a fiscal problem, simply because they were big spenders or didn't manage their affairs well, would be able to come in and ask for the state to bail them out. Obviously that's...I'm not in favor of that and I don't think anybody on the floor is. If the people who are in charge of government don't manage their own affairs in a, in a manner that's prudent, then I don't think that they should be rewarded. Our whole purpose in following this was somewhat...
