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SENATOR HARTNETT: They would just run like...

SENATOR HILLMAN: Yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: But the other offices in the county, county attorney, county clerk and so forth, would be...would be appointed as you...

SENATOR HILLMAN: Yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: ...as you...

SENATOR HILLMAN: Right. And my assumption would be there are certain elected officers in place right now that those county boards would appoint because they do a good job. It's not to say that administrative, that all the administrative officials on a county level aren't doing a good job because there's many of them that do. And I will say that in some cases they would be glad to be appointed. They don't have to run for office every year, and so they wouldn't have to campaign. They would do that by virtue of it being a professional position and they would be hired by the, with the approval of the county commissioners in doing that. I think you can run across instances where the actual really professional work and the expertise in a county department perhaps has been by an employee who has been there for 10 or 15 years, that the elected official of that particular department, any time they want to know something they go to that employee. And by rights, that employee probably should be the head of that particular area in county government. But by virtue of having to run for office and so forth hasn't been able to do that.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Thank you. Senator Janssen, do you want some time if there is...

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Janssen, you have about one minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's probably all I'll need, Madam Speaker. There's a few things I'd like to bring. I voted in committee to bring this to the floor because I felt as though it needed to be discussed out here. But I have a problem assuring myself that this would be a way to save money.
