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talking about this. We have pieces of this out there, but we have not had any effort to pull the pieces together and say, how does this fit together? What makes sense? We have everybody looking at a different part of it. We have an electrical board, we've got the fire marshal, we've got the state marshal, local marshal, we've got the local authorities, we've got the local inspectors, but nobody's taken those pieces and pulled them together and say, how's this system working? Is it working as well as it can?

SENATOR ROBINSON: I'm trying to think, I had another thought here. I'll punch my light again, thank you.

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR WESELY: But if I could respond a little bit. Again, the idea is you have a lot of different people involved with the housing industry, housing issues. This is to bring them all to the same table, say how is this functioning, how's it working, can we make improvements, and then come back to us with those recommendations. I don't see where any loss is suffered by anybody by getting that information and those ideas. It will take us to follow up, to decide anything. There is no power inherently given to this task force other than that the power of making a recommendation.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay, okay, let's say we get into the bill. Let's say it passes, and you know what's going to happen, we're going to...someone's going to try to go through the Appropriations Committee and get, I don't know how many millions of dollars for this. Now, I guess at that point I have a great concern, because I've seen other things happen in this Legislature that, that money's not parceled out in what I call a very fair way. And I guess this is a concern that I have. We turn it over to a...to one of the agencies and...

SENATOR COORDSEN: Time.

SENATOR ROBINSON: ...then we're at their mercy.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Robinson. Senator Wehrbein.
