opportunity to address Senator Lindsay's point of order prior to my ruling. Senator Stuhr, if you would care to address the motion, you may do so.

SENATOR STUHR: All right. I guess I would like to know the reasoning. As I stated earlier, at the time that I filed the motion I did so in good faith. I followed the rule as it was printed and I am complying with what I feel is the rule.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Okay. Senator Lindsay has raised a point of order, Senator Stuhr has given an argument as to why she thinks the rule is...the motion is in order. And I would indicate that this is one the body, I understand, will ultimately decide. It doesn't make a lot of difference which way I rule because I know there will be a motion to overrule, and it's appropriate that the body should rule in this case. There are good arguments on both sides. The argument that the bill is not currently in the committee and the bill is on ..reported on the worksheet as killed, and the appropriate motion would be to revive a killed bill is a sound one. The argument that Senator Stuhr filed the appropriate motion for the state of the bill on the day when she filed it is also a sound argument. I am going to rule...largely because I think it is incumbent upon the Chair to be supportive of the institutions of committees and such, I will rule that this motion is out of order at this time. Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR STUHR: Do...I move then to overrule the Chair.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Question before the body now is, shall the Chair be overruled? The Chair has ruled that this motion is out of order. I would also indicate that if the Chair is sustained then a motion for...this is gratuitous, but just so everybody understands, a motion to place the bill on General File, after a bill has been killed, would in fact be in order. And I would rule that that would, in fact, be in order. But at this point I've ruled that out of order. Senator Stuhr has ruled (sic) that the Chair be overruled. As I remember our rules, each member has an opportunity to speak once and once only on the motion to overrule the Chair. We will proceed down the list of those seeking recognition. Senator Chambers, followed by Senator Lindsay, Kristensen, Witek, Will, Bernard-Stevens, Bromm, and Stuhr.
