

wouldn't be a consultant. So the \$5,000 figure is all that we are talking about, and that's a one year only.

SENATOR VRTISKA: But this...but this, what about the fiscal note ther? You're going to...there is going to be a A bill with this that will have a figure in it,...

SENATOR WESELY: No, no...

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...or is it this going to ccme out of Appropriations, or what?

SENATOR WESELY: No, there is no requirement for funding in the bill. There won't be any A bill with it. We will...as part of the bill, there is an advisory committee that will look at dedicated funding source that they will recommend back to us, and then we can decide next session whether we take that route, or whether we ask Appropriations, or whether we do anything.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, I guess what I'm trying to...listening to Senator Maurstad and others, I'm trying to determine when will this task force be set up. I notice you have what, fifteen people, and the funds are going to be used to pay for their expenses, travel, et cetera. Is that, basically, what you're talking about?

SENATOR WESELY: That isn't absolutely the case in the bill. I mean I don't think that they're reimbursed for their expenses. The bill doesn't allow for that.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Then what is the funding for?

SENATOR WESELY: Well, there's...there are two task for...there is a task force set to look at the question of the codes and their enforcement, which we talked about last week. There's an advisory committee to look at the fund and establishing the rules and regulation. The \$5,000 is for the task force looking at the codes and those issues, and they're going to need materials prepared and, you know, copies of things made, and so those kind of expenses are what we're talking about.

SENATOR VRTISKA: But that task force isn't in place at this point?
