CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See page 1007 of the Legislative Journal.) 21 ayes, 9 nays on the amendment, Mr. President.

SPEAKER WITHEM: The amendment is not agreed to. The call is raised. Mr. Clerk, next item.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Maurstad would move to amend. Senator, I have FA473 in front of me.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Maurstad.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment 473 addresses with taking out some language on the bottom of page 4 and the top of page 5 dealing with the Department of Economic Development, identifying those areas where there is a shortage of afforda...of affordable housing, excuse me, easy for me to say, and also on the page 5, striking out that section dealing with the housing education program? My next amendment up also strikes some language on that same page dealing with for-profit entities but, quite frankly, I think we've had a good...a good debate, and so, Madam President, I would ask unanimous consent to withdraw both of the next two amendments.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Madam President and members, my amendment is found on page 7, line 16. It's rather a simple amendment. At times when we start programs and we have commissions and so on, we fail to look at the whole picture, and after it's passed and down the road a year, well, we look back and say, I should have done this, I should have done that, and we know we get caught in these circumstances. And this was not an intentional oversight, it's just simply we did not...we failed to get in the language
