

I appreciate that. I rise in, to the point of, I don't know what to do on this amendment because I understand what Senator Wesely is saying. And I hope the body is paying attention to this one, this amendment because it should raise the level of the uncomfortableness that some members are feeling, including myself. I've been uncomfortable with what we're doing, but I'm willing to advance, I've been willing to advance it, and still am inclined to do so because I don't like the way the system is going now. But, but, but, if you go to any of the national conferences, one of the key factors of this type of legislation is the sharing of information. Senator Bohlke and I have worked for a long time trying to get information from DSS and courts shared with the school districts so that teachers and administrators know what the type of individual they have so they don't put that student in a situation that they may not be able to survive or may not be able to do the right thing. These issues of confidentiality are very difficult. HIV is another example of the difficulty of confidentiality. But, but, but, the whole concept of bringing these agencies together is based upon a fundamental, or at least one of the fundamental concepts of it is the sharing of information. I am not necessarily opposed to taking the portion out of the bill because it does cause problems. But I am very uncomfortable with the fact that we'll say we'll have an interim study, because I'm cynical enough, being around these issues of confidentiality, to know that after the elections are over and we really get down to what we need to share, that this body will not be able to come to grips with the actual sharing of confidential information. And even if we do there's going to be difficulty in the courts. And the only reason I bring this issue up is I suspect the amendment will be adopted, but I want the body to understand, again, what we're doing is you're taking the concept of these entities getting together to share resources, to work together by the sharing of information. And we'll be now passing legislation that says, we want to have an interim study, we don't know what it's going to show, we don't know how we're going to do as a body, and you're going to, at some point, I'll tell you, on certain areas of confidentiality, you're not going to be able to make a decision because Senator Dierks will want to keep confidential and no one sharing the HIV. The courts will want to keep confidential some of their issues because school districts don't have the right to know or shouldn't have the right to know to protect the confidentiality of the person in the courts. Other people will protect the confidentiality and
