PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Wesely. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, what Senator Wesely said just made me think of an example I can give of how the poor, the dispossessed are utilized to create all kind of opportunities for the better classes, for the politically powerful, but then they are cast aside when we get down to the real nuts and bolts of what's to be done, even though it involves them in a very intimate, personal way. There is a Negro chap named Alan Keyes, who fancies himself to be a candidate for the presidency of the United States of America, and he is running as a "Repelican." Now he goes around the country saying what white people have always wanted to hear come out of a black man's mouth, and because he will serve this function, they have tolerated him. He pretends to think that he's on the same level as these white candidates. All he has been is a token, a curio, a sideshow, but now that it is getting down to the real nuts and bolts of the campaign, he's in the way. So when the real candidates, meaning the white candidates, were going to have a debate in Atlanta, George, he had brainwashed himself to the extent of believing that he was a candidate on the same basis as these white men. So he went into the studio with his ignorant, brainwashed self and presented himself as a participant in the debate, and they told him, fool, what do you think you're doing here? He said, well, I've come to debate. They said, don't you know your place? He said, well, in the last few days, you fellows have kind of let me get out of my place. Usually you make me wear a tall hat, a long coat with a split in the back, and brass buttons, and you give me a long title, but today you don't want me around, what has happened? They said, your place has not changed. But he believed that it had. So you know what the white fellows did who were running for the presidency of the United States, and they are going to represent everybody, look out for everybody's interest? They called the police, and in the picture that I saw in the newspaper was this fine, upstanding, Negro Christian gentleman in the clutches of the local constabulary with the look of shock, amazement, and disbelief on his face; mouth open wide enough to swallow a bushel basket of apples, being led
