

SENATOR WESELY: Oh, I see, you mean the current number of agencies and committees and the like?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Correct.

SENATOR WESELY: Yeah, I think that, obvious...that is going to be one of the things that's looked at in this study and, again, this bill doesn't change it in the current statutes. A lot of them are created by statute, so they will have to come back to us, but I'm sure that's one of the things they will look at is duplication of different advisory groups and whether they can bring it back down.

SENATOR VRTISKA: See, that's why I am telling you I am not sure I support this, but I support the concept of trying to bring many different committees, commissions, together so that they can be dealing with the issue as a whole rather than each, everybody out doing their own, basically saying they are doing their own thing, and not willing, or not necessarily willing, but not able to communicate together to see that common ground is reached and we do then eliminate some of the duplication that we have in some of these...some of these committees. I've served on a number of those, as you, and has another...a lot of other people here, and I certainly don't criticize it. I am not here for the purpose of criticizing, I just merely make the point, is there, in fact, as we are exploring new ways, is there a better way, and I guess you brought the point out, we need to come back as the Legislature and decide how many of these ought to exist, and how many ought to be combined, how we ought to restructure it. Is that what...

SENATOR WESELY: That's exactly right.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...you're basically saying?

SENATOR WESELY: That's right.

SENATOR VRTISKA: When is that going to happen?

SENATOR WESELY: That should be now this next January that we should have legislation with that sort of proposal.
