The only way for something to be done on complaints is through working through the Governor's Office, where they make changes, or the agency, the superdirector will make a change, or senators, legislatively, would make a change. And so I think if we go to the public and say, good news, we've set up this kind of a superagency and don't worry, members of the public, if you have a concern, all you have to do is call this 800 number and somebody will take your concern and deal with it, and nothing happens at that point, I think the public would be very frustrated. I think the public will, if there are problems, certainly they are going to complain, but the best people for them to lodge their complaint with would be us, and then we have the final oversight, we have the final say on what budgets are going to be. We have the final say, if we want to, legislatively what we want to do. So I don't...I don't oppose the intent behind the amendment. I do think that it would not accomplish what Senator Stuhr is trying to do of bringing some comfortability factor to the people who have a problem. I think they would be more comfortable knowing, which they still can, even with your amendment, that they could call their representative or somebody in government that would take their cause to heart and would try to make things happen. So, for that reason, I oppose the legis...the amendment at this point. Senator Chambers, on a different topic, and I am going to take liberty, Senator Stuhr, on your amendment to expand into other areas. I offered the bracket motion simply to bring the body's attention to something that they had done when they had struck the ability to share information between the entities that are being combined in lieu of an interim study. If I am not comfortable with what we are doing on that, I probably still will offer the bracket motion at some point, but I understand there is a bracket motion filed, in fact, there may be two bracket motions filed, one to a date certain, and one simply a bracket motion. So if those are going to be brought up, I won't...I won't do that. If there are not, certainly I'll...I'll file it because I do have some difficulties on the confidentiality part. But at this particular point, Senator Stuhr, I'll maybe be the only person, but that's why I am going to be putting a red light on the amendment.
