

but will they? Maybe there's a dangerous road out there that they aren't going to recognize. So I have a little problem with setting it at 65 miles an hour. And I realize out in the area, in Senator Elmer's area, Senator Matzke's area, and Senator Wickersham's area, yes, those roads you probably can go 65 miles, I'm sure they go that fast now. Apparently they do, 'cause I had the opportunity to look at Senator Wickersham's record on his drivers license, yesterday, and it indicated that possibly he has been going that fast on occasion. So I just want you to be aware that we are putting a lot of faith in the Department of Roads to specify which roads should be at that 65 miles an hour, and the ones that should be less. And Senator Lynch has a few words to say, so I'll give the rest of my time to Senator Lynch.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Senator Lynch, you have approximately two and a half minutes.

SENATOR LYNCH: Senator Bernard-Stevens, and thank you, Senator Janssen. I couldn't help but notice that Senator Schrock applied a little LCL here, that's local control logic. You know he said let the local governments determine how fast they should go. And I was even stretching a little St. Thomas philosophy here, too, and I thought of this. It suggests that we do things for moral reasons and because it's right and because it's fair, generally put, in laymen's terms, today. So we all know young people drive too fast, and even in some cases old people drive too slow. So why don't we get an amendment passed that we drive our age, not to exceed 75 miles an hour, because then we know these young people that are getting hurt and killed because they're going too darn fast, if you're 21 years old, 21 miles an hour, you can't get hurt too bad I don't think, can you? Think what it will do for insurance rates. Think of how those costs for kids, if they're paying it themselves, and the folks who are probably picking up the tab for them, think what they'll pay. Think of all the lives we'll save. And I'd just like to suggest that, old St. Augustine, if you're up there listening, why, send me a sign of whether I'm right or wrong. (Laughter) But Senator Matzke smiled at me, that's good enough for me. (Laugh) But I would not really seriously suggest that. But on the other hand, I thought I should share that thought with you today. Thank you very much.
