SENATOR JANSSEN: All right. Prior to this amendment, would they have had to have a permit to come back out?

SENATOR DIERKS: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: So in no way does this change the brand areas at all in the state.

SENATOR DIERKS: It doesn't change the brand area. It changes some of the permit requirements to allow people who have property, both in and out of the brand area, to move their cattle into the brand area and then with the same permit to move them back out.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right, so this would basically be the same thing for someone who rents a pasture then...

SENATOR DIERKS: That's right.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...in that brand area.

SENATOR DIERKS: Yeah, and...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay.

SENATOR DIERKS: ...they can get a permit to do that.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right, thank you.

SENATOR DIERKS: You bet.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Beutler, on the Dierks amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Dierks, I just wanted to ask you quickly, with regard to damages to other people's land, you're eliminating "cultivated", and it applies to all lands. It says, damages done by the stock upon the lands of another. I assume that that means damages to property, or damages to persons, either one?

SENATOR DIERKS: I would assume that, too.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. I just wanted to thank you for looking out for some of the trails people, and I appreciate (laughter)
