SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...master plan for constructing my house?

SENATOR DIERKS: Probably.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You would?

SENATOR DIERKS: It depends on how far we're going to go with this thing, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Dierks. Members of the Legislature, when Senator Dierks, as practical as he is, is reduced to what he just gave to me, it shows you there is nothing of substance in this bill and he knows it. He would not consent to constructing a program related to veterinary medicine that is done in such a slipshod, general way as this without a plan. The farmers on the floor I'm sure are watching what Congress is doing, with reference to the farm bill, with far more care than they're exercising with reference to what we're doing as a Legislature. I am, frankly, greatly disappointed at the way the Legislature is behaving with reference to this matter.

SENATOR ABOUD: Madam President, I'll yield my time to Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Abboud. Madam President, members of the Legislature, I want these things in the record. I'd like to ask Senator Jensen a question or two, because he had pointed out on the floor some time ago that he doesn't have a college degree, so maybe in talking to him it will be different from the situation where it's like trying to carry on a conversation through a double mattress. SENATOR JENSEN: That's true.
