PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Madam President. Senator Chambers, you know I...unless you just don't want the bill, I think we are headed the same direction with this thing. So I'm having a little difficulty figuring out why we're having such a large discussion. I think it's certainly your wish that if they sell any land they do it in such a way that it complies with their fiduciary duties, and that's the law, as a matter of fact, and that's my wish as well. Now, you know the plan that they come up with, I hope will be reasonable, will be possible, will be doable and not something that is outlandish, to borrow a word my mother uses a lot, or something that is unworkable. And so the intent of putting that language in there is simply to ask this board to do their very best job, using a good faith effort to put together a plan for a sale within the constraints and time limits established by the Legislature. We don't want them to violate their fiduciary duties, and so that's why the words are there. Now I'm not stuck on those words if I could be convinced that we absolutely don't need them. I've never had this happen before, have I... Madam President, I will yield the balance of my time to Senator Chamber.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Chambers, there's three and a half minutes remaining.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I will withdraw that amendment and file it at the bottom of whatever is up there now.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. The amendment is withdrawn. Mr. Clerk.
