

they're on the phone now. But 1046 is where we're at now. We're not on the 1141. And the Fiscal Office said, on 1046, and I concur with that, that there was no fiscal impact, there were no dollars needed, even if we did 1046, you know, by itself, which we now have on 1141. And here's what the comments were on the fiscal note, 1046 eliminates a termination date for the evaluation. The bill specifies that such evaluation services shall be supplemented, and now it will be ended by December 31, 1999. The agency had not yet budgeted nor begun the process of elimination of evaluation services at the YRTC's. Community-based juvenile evaluation services were funded beginning fiscal year '95-96, but only on a pilot basis. Elimination of the termination date, thus, will have no fiscal impact on the Department of Corrections. I'm comfortable with that, and I really don't believe that we need to have the A bill. So I think what I would do at this point is I would urge a no vote on the A bill, and if, for some reason, we need to, if this is changed, as I don't believe it has and we need to make an adjustment on the budget when it comes up, I'd certainly be willing to do so, and I assume Senator Wehrbein would be as well. But at this point I don't believe it's necessary, I think we're covered.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you. Senator Wehrbein, your light is next.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. Speaker and members, I'm not sure what to do, whether we kill an A bill, can we...if we can revive it? I don't know that there's an A bill necessary at this point. I promise to look into that and see if we need it, even if it was a small one. And so by killing that I...Mr. Clerk, can we revive that, if we kill a bill here at this...or fail to advance?

SENATOR WILL: Mr. Clerk, would you respond.

CLERK: Senator, it would take two votes on Select File for it to be indefinitely postponed. So the first vote...it would have to come up again and fail a second time before it would stand indefinitely postponed.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.

CLERK: So if you voted not to advance today, there really would not be any permanent action attached to that.
