

enough to prohibit, if you are going out of the home to vote, so I don't know why we wouldn't see fit, in all fairness, to prohibit it if you are staying in your home to vote. I think there is a number of other issues, but this is one area that I wanted to address and saw as probably the biggest potential for a harassment situation, and I know you can talk about democracy all that you want, but voters, the democracy comes when an individual seeks from their own independent decision to go look for information or find out information about an issue or an individual. It doesn't come from government insisting that, you know, we come right down to their home and shove it into their face, so that's where I think it's that independent decision to inform yourself, that that's where we have our individual personal democracy, I believe more of a personal thing, and an independent decision. And I don't want to allow that we are now going to have any special interest group who has something on a ballot to go and just blanket continually an area for votes, which it can be done and more than likely will be done, although when you have this in practice, we can make adjustments if that's the case. Now we can do something about it. Before we put it in, two amendments to address fraud, which I have, two amendments to address fraud, it is nothing even close to the 20 pages that we have to address fraud in every other situation, voting situation. So I would ask that you adopt this amendment to address the situation of door to door and give people that space, and the next amendment following also, and I think that's the least that we could do to discuss the issues and to do something about it, do a little more than just discuss the issues of fraud on the mail-in ballots that it seems that they may have the votes to move forward. I would ask for your adoption of this amendment. Thank you.
