

That includes two 100-bed modular units. In addition to that there's Nebraska v. Wyoming water litigation, an additional 583,000 this year, additional 1,757,000 for the next year of the biennium. Juvenile services grants, line 28, 1,273,000 has to do with the bill yesterday of Senator Bernard-Stevens. We put in about a third of the money that was in his bill, and all it does is expand Juvenile Services statewide. We had in it, last year, a so-called pilot, it really wasn't a pilot but it was four centers. This expands it to eight. It's the committee's feeling that juvenile crime is a very serious issue in Nebraska. This is a way we can get at preventing that via LB 988, two years ago. We have some continued funding of Kearney-Geneva, on line 29. That is to keep Kearney open another year because of our severe overcrowding in our correctional facilities. We'll get into more detail on that in the coming amendment. We replaced the federal funds of \$406,000 under Office of Juvenile Services, once again in an area that we feel is rapidly growing and we need to continue to add funds to that. We also, in line 31, have a \$350,000 allocated for planning money for a new correctional facility. I will have an amendment to discuss that in more detail later for discussion purposes, a 480-bed unit. I will be handing out some information on the, once again, the overcrowding situation we have in our correctional facilities. Thirty-two is additional law clerks to the Court of Appeals. If you read the paper yesterday, there was an article on the increasing workload in the Court of Appeals. We did put the Court of Appeals in here about three years ago, in an effort to get at the backlog of cases of the Supreme Court. We did work on that. The backlog did decline. It is now picking up again and the Court of Appeals is in need of more clerical clerks, and so we have added additional \$350,000. That's on line 32. A special ed deficit is simply a funding this year of a special ed after the fact preschool deficit, after the fact. In line 34 is a secure youth facility, that is the site purchase and preparation of the Omaha correctional facility that was so controversial. We added \$630,000, that was done in late January, in order to recognize the difficulty in locating a site in Omaha that was satisfactory to at least a majority of the people involved in this decision. There were many sites in Omaha, some of which were cheaper, but they were not...did not meet the concerns of the neighborhoods and so forth. And so, in order to have a site that was at least satisfactory to most, we took a little more money for site preparation. This represents that money, \$630,000. The homestead exemption, the rest of
