here and an office there, because those things are not large expenditures of money. So would you like to tell me some examples, on the time that I have remaining, or whatever part of it you need, where specific savings are going to occur as far as property taxes?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Well, Senator, if you want to continue, of course, you'd only have one county board, depending on the pay of the county board, you'd certainly eliminate those positions.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is there any...anything in the bill that says you cannot have the total number of both county boards but have them just one county board? For example, there are six in one and five commissioners in the other, and now you have an eleven-member county board, is there anything that prohibits that?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: No, there's a statutory limit on the number of county commissioners you can have.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what is that number?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: I don't recall.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I wasn't aware of that.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Three and five? Somebody is telling me three and five.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. So then there's no county....

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: No, I'm getting different numbers, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yeah, uh-huh.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: We're going to have to have some revisions here.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, that's what always happens.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.
