You know, if it basically says, no, that we use...the figures are derived from data and the data is in the computer and if the computer has the wrong date, for example, I can go into my computer now and it has the year 1996, I can change that computer now to show the year 1990. I mean, I can do that now. I can change the computer to say, I think, the year 1802. I can do that now. You know, the question is does it...do we need to spend that much out of 309 on the buildings that we know we have to fund on something that may be an inconvenience on a date? And if there is some rationale that, no, we won't be able to do any of the programs because they're all going to screwed up and I could explain...

SENATOR WILL: Time.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: ..how that works, it may make a difference, but I haven't heard that yet.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you Senator Bernard-Stevens. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members of the body, Senator Bernard-Stevens, I'll try to answer these questions a little bit because it does impact the calculations. Everything that we...if you have a six-digit code and the last two digits, when it turns over to 2000, become 00, all your calculations are based, let's say for a driver's license, you automatically get notified that you...your driver's license is due. It could be...it's based on four years, every four years. Maybe you don't get notified, but let's assume you do. the computer will
