SENATOR BEUTLER: The Court Administrator's Office, Senator, doesn't have any problem with the process. They think it can be worked out without problems...without any administrative problems of any type.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: The only trouble is, they don't practice law.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, they keep all the records. I think they know how that system works.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: And they do do...I got to tell you, they do do a good job. I'm just saying that, as a practical matter, this is an awfully large change to go through on Consent Calendar and I'd...maybe there's something. My friends at the Bar Association may support it but that makes me real nervous, the change. And I don't think that I'm ready for that change but, I don't know.
